

WOYZECK (DRAMA) October 19-23

An unusual play with a title that is almost impossible to pronounce. George Bucner's antiromantic and starkley realistic play is a striking forerunner of modern drama. In quickly changing scenes, the life of Woyzeck, a common soldier, is traced with irony, compassion, and mystic experiences. Woyzeck will be entered in the American College Theatre Festival.

BRIGHTON BEACH MEMOIRS (COMEDY/DRAMA) November 20-December 3

Neil Simon's autobiographical memory play of a Brooklyn teenager in 1937 living with his family in crowded, lower-middle-class circumstances.

THE CURIOUS SAVAGE (COMEDY) February 14-19

John Patrick's sympathetic but humorous view of the prominent Savage family as the children, a judge, a senator, and a socialite, try to commit their aged mother in a prestigious asylum. As the story unfolds, the residents seem much more "normal" than the conniving family.



KISS ME KATE (MUSICAL) March 28 - April 2

Cole Porter's delightful lyrics and music combine with Bella and Samuel Spewack's book. A traveling theatrical company performs a musical of Shakespeare's "THE TAMING OF THE SHREW." Memorable songs such as "Another Op'ning, Another Show," "Wunderbar," and "So in Love" are among the best in American musical theatre.
