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## STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

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## SPRING TERM

The spring term begins March 13, and one may make the full term's work by entering not over two weeks late. However, since we shall have an Easter vacation of one week during the A. E. A. the latest date for entrance will be April 2. Of course in order to be permitted to enter at that time one must be providentially hindered from coming on opening date.

## THE SUMMER SCHOOL

Registration for the summer school begins May 28. The work offered is as follows:

1. Regular academic and professional courses leading to professional certificates without examination.
2. Professional and academic work for extension of certificates including professional and validated certificates.
3. Academic work for removing conditions and making additional credits for students of high schools, normal schools and colleges.

## TWO SUMMER TERMS

School work begins Tuesday, May 28 and closes August 11. It is divided into two terms as follows:

1. The first division closes July 7.
2. The second division closes August 11.

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A uniform fee of \$4.00 per session hour which is equivalent to three term hours is required in all public institutions of higher learning, including the normal schools. Students taking any one of the regular courses of eighteen term hours per quarter will pay \$24.00, plus expenses set forth above and the ordinary supply fees shown in the catalog.

All fees are payable by the term in advance, and no fees are refunded.

These fees are the same whether one stays the entire term or only a part of it.

### FACULTY

The faculty for the summer school is the regular normal school faculty of over thirty members, supplemented by the addition of a good number of experts now holding important educational positions in and out of the state.

### DORMITORY

One dollar reservation fee for a room in the dormitory should be sent for spring or summer attendance. Our dormitory accommodations are limited for both men and women and they are taxed to the limit in the spring and summer. We can accommodate the overflow though by securing rooms in the town for them. We have rooms for light house-keeping on the school grounds. Others may be obtained in the city.

### WHAT TO BRING

Six towels, one pillow, two pairs pillow cases, two white spreads, one pair of blankets, two pairs of sheets, one spoon and one drinking glass.

### HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES

Graduates of high schools who expect to teach will have a good opportunity here to get professional preparation. They can enter at set intervals and get in six terms of three months each.

If one attends thirty-six weeks he will receive a Class B certificate good for three years. (See Supt. Tidwell's announcement of changes in certification law elsewhere in this Bulletin.)

### CLIMATE

The summers in Jacksonville are unusually mild and temperate, the nights always pleasant, the town being surrounded by mountains.

### REDUCED RAILROAD RATES

Most of the railroads in this section of the state are granting round-trip rates. Apply to your agent when buying ticket to Jacksonville. You must write to us for an identification certificate.

### VISIT OF OFFICIALS

Superintendent Tidwell and Secretary P. W. Hodges of the State Department are expected to visit the summer school at a time to be set later.

### COACHING COURSE GIVEN

In addition to the regular courses offered, a coaching course in athletics will be given in the Physical Education Department. This is of special interest to principals and assistants who have some form of athletics started in their schools and who undertake to do this work.

### DORMITORY FOR MEN

A modern, steam-heated, fire-proof dormitory for men is now

completed and is available for occupancy during the summer school. Reservations should be made early.

#### CONFERENCE OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS AND SUPERVISORS

A conference of county superintendents and supervisors of this district will be held during the summer school. A representative of the State Department of Education at Montgomery will be present.

#### OPPORTUNITIES FOR PHYSICAL EXERCISES AND DEVELOPMENT

Physical instructors for men and women will be on hand during the summer school. Formal gymnastics will be given daily for men and women and regular periods will be set apart for the playing of games consisting of volley ball, baseball, indoor baseball for girls, and tennis. The gymnasium with competent instructors for both men and women will be open twice per week for each. Games which teachers may use in their schools will be played and taught. All students are taught to swim in the outdoor swimming pool connected with the gymnasium.

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### Announcements of State Department of Education For Summer Schools, 1928.

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#### REQUIREMENTS FOR CONTINUANCE, EXTENSION, AND RENEWAL OF CERTIFICATES.

- I. Certificates issued on examination and by validation from other States.
  1. Holders of certificates issued on examination or by validation from other states are required to take for continuance, extension, or renewal of their certificates in normal schools the regular courses which are accepted for graduation, and in colleges either the courses offered for pre-normal certificates or other courses for which credit is given toward graduation. The following exceptions should be noted:
    - a. All holders of such certificates who have not successfully completed the courses in Health Education and Public School Music, Course I, shall take such courses unless they are pursuing special subjects or those required for credit toward degrees.
    - b. A special certificate in music will be extended only upon the completion by its holder of music courses in an approved college or conservatory for six or twelve weeks.
  2. No credit will be allowed for continuance, extension, or renewal of such certificate for a shorter course than six weeks in which the student completes at least six semester hours or nine quarter hours of work. Double credit will be allowed for twelve weeks of work with twelve semester hours or eighteen quarter hours.
  3. An applicant for the continuance, the extension, or the renewal of such certificate must pass on all courses prescribed or elected before the institution offering the courses may recommend to the State Department of Education the certificate desired.



## II. Pre-Normal Certificates.

1. The issuance of second class pre-normal certificates to high school graduates based upon three-month professional courses has been discontinued. Those high school graduates who hold or have held second class pre-normal certificates will be permitted to take the prescribed three-month courses offered in the normal schools and the colleges in the summer of 1928 to extend these certificates or to raise them to first class pre-normal ones. All holders of first class pre-normal certificates issued in or prior to the summer of 1927 may extend these on the completion of three-month courses offered in the normal schools and the colleges or raise them to class B elementary professional certificates upon meeting scholarship and residence requirements in the normal schools. Beginning with certificates bearing date of July 1, 1927, the minimum amount of professional training on which a certificate without examination may be issued is the completion of the first year of work in a class A normal school.

2. Holders of pre-normal certificates should, if at all practicable, take courses to extend or to raise them in the same institutions from which original recommendations for certification were made. Transfer of credits from one institution to another is inadvisable because of necessary deductions and inevitable loss of time. A person preparing to teach in high school should take courses in a college, while one seeking to qualify for teaching in the elementary schools should attend a normal school.

3. An applicant for the issuance or the extension of a pre-normal certificate must obtain credit for fourteen quarter hours before the institution offering the courses is authorized to recommend the issuance or the extension of such certificate by the State Department of Education.

4. Pre-Normal certificates may be issued or extended upon the satisfactory completion of at least fourteen hours of any of the regular eighteen-hour courses offered for the summer quarter of the State Normal schools.

## III. Class B Elementary Certificates.

1. Holders of Class B Elementary Certificates are required to take for the extension of their certificates those courses only which lead to the issuance of the elementary A certificate. These courses are given in normal schools and in approved normal departments of colleges and universities. All applicants for the issuance or the extension of Class B elementary professional certificates who have not previously completed the courses in Health Education and Public School Music, Course I, shall be required to take these in lieu of some required courses in subject matter and methods. No credit will be allowed for the extension of such certificates for a shorter period than twelve weeks, in which the student completes at least twelve semester hours or eighteen quarter hours of work.

2. Holders of Class B Elementary Certificates should, if at all practicable, continue their courses in the same institutions that recommended them for certification.

## V. Holders of Class A Elementary Certificates, Class A Secondary Certificates, and Certificates of Special Subjects are required to take for continuance or extension of their certificates those

courses for which credit is allowed in the institutions giving them. No credit will be allowed for continuance, extension, or renewal of such certificates for a shorter course than six weeks in which the student completes at least six semester hours or nine quarter hours of work. Double credit will be allowed for twelve weeks of work with twelve semester hours or eighteen quarter hours. These courses are given in the colleges only.

- VI. The registrar of such institution shall enter on the proper blank, furnished by the State Department of Education, for every person entitled to issuance, continuance, extension or renewal of a certificate of any kind a complete record of credits with grades.
- VII. All persons who are to receive certificates of any kind bearing date of July 1, 1928, shall arrange before leaving the summer school for their applications to be submitted directly from the institution to the State Department of Education. It will facilitate the handling of applications if holders of certificates to be continued, extended or renewed will attach these to their applications.

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TENTATIVE CHANGES IN REGULATIONS FOR THE ISSU-  
ANCE OF TEACHERS' CERTIFICATES ON  
TRAINING IN NORMAL SCHOOLS.

(Announcement authorized by Supt. Tidwell.)

PRE-NORMAL CERTIFICATES

- I. Second Class:  
A second class pre-normal certificate may be issued to a person who has completed the first year of the pre-normal course offered by the normal schools of Alabama.
- II. First Class:  
A first class pre-normal certificate may be issued to a person who has completed the second year of the pre-normal course offered by the normal schools of Alabama.

NORMAL PROFESSIONAL CERTIFICATES

- I. Class B:
  1. A class B normal primary certificate valid for a period of three years may be issued to a person who has completed the first year of the two-year normal course for the training of primary teachers offered in the normal schools of Alabama. This certificate will authorize its holder to teach only in grades 1-4 inclusive.
  2. A class B normal intermediate certificate valid for a period of three years may be issued to a person who has completed the first year of the two-year normal course for the training of intermediate teachers offered in the normal schools of Alabama. This certificate will authorize its holder to teach only in grades 4-7 inclusive.
  3. A class B normal junior high certificate valid for a period of three years may be issued to a person who has completed the first year of the two-year normal course for the training of junior high school teachers offered in the normal schools of Alabama. This certificate will authorize its holder to teach only in grades 6-9 inclusive.
- II. Class A:
  1. A class A normal primary certificate valid for a period of six years may be issued to a graduate of a normal school in the course

for the training of primary teachers. This certificate will authorize its holder to teach only in grades 1-4 inclusive.

2. A class A normal intermediate certificate valid for a period of six years may be issued to a graduate of a normal school in the course for the training of intermediate teachers. This certificate will authorize its holder to teach only in grades 4-7 inclusive.

3. A class A normal junior high certificate valid for a period of six years may be issued to a graduate of a normal school in the course for the training of junior high school teachers. This certificate will authorize its holder to teach only in grades 6-9 inclusive.

### III. Permanent:

A permanent normal professional certificate may be issued on graduation from a standard normal school or equivalent education to a person who has taught successfully in the schools of Alabama for a period of five years on a class A normal professional or equivalent certificate. This certificate will authorize its holder to teach only in those grades represented by major training and experience. This certificate will remain in force only so long as its holder may continue to teach with satisfactory results in the schools of Alabama.

## ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

1. An applicant should bring and present to the classification committee any letters he may have received from the Normal School regarding credits. A certified copy of one's high school work should be sent to the Normal School by the principal on blank to be furnished by this school.

2. The equivalent of four years of high school work or fifteen units is required for entrance to Class A schools, said entrance requirements to be determined either by certificate or by examination as the president may elect. (For entrance to the pre-normal courses see note 6 below.)

3. Graduates from a four-year accredited high school are admitted to the junior year without examination.

4. Graduates of Class A colleges may enter senior year without examination and complete the professional course in one year or three terms.

5. Applicants for admission without certificates may enter any class by passing satisfactory examinations upon the work below the point of entrance.

6. Students of eighteen years of age who have eight units of high school work or hold a teachers' certificate may enter pre-normal at the discretion of the president.

7. Students from high schools not accredited will be classified as pre-normals or remain unclassified until they meet the entrance requirements.

8. Opportunity to take the entrance examinations will be given within the first three weeks of the quarter to those who have made sufficient previous preparation.

9. No student who enters over one week late will be permitted to undertake the full load of 18 hours of work.
