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STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

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SPRING TERM

The spring term begins March 11, and one may make the full term's work by entering not over two weeks late. However, since we shall have an Easter vacation of one week during the A. E. A. the latest date for entrance will be April 2. Of course in order to be permitted to enter at that time one must be providentially hindered from coming on-opening date.

THE SUMMER SCHOOL

Registration for the summer school begins May 28. The work offered is as follows:

1. Regular academic and professional courses leading to professional certificates without examination.
2. Professional and academic work for extension of certificates including professional and validated certificates.
3. Academic work for removing conditions and making additional credits for students of high schools, normal schools and colleges.

TWO SUMMER TERMS

School work begins Tuesday, May 28 and closes August 9. It is divided into two terms as follows:

1. The first division closes July 6.
2. The second division closes August 9.

EXPENSES—SUMMER SCHOOL

All students pay an entrance fee of \$30.00 in advance. This fee includes charges for athletics, library, general medical attention and all other fees of whatever name except diploma fee. Students who enter in July, with the expectation of receiving only a half-term's credit, will pay an entrance fee of \$20.00, which is to cover all fees and charges for tuition except diploma fees.

FACULTY

The faculty for the summer school is the regular normal school faculty of forty members, supplemented by the addition of a good number of experts now holding important educational positions in and out of the state.

DORMITORY

One dollar reservation fee for a room in the dormitory should be sent for spring or summer attendance. Our dormitory accommodations are limited for both men and women and they are taxed to the limit in the spring and summer. We can accommodate the overflow though by securing rooms in the town for them. We have rooms for light house-keeping on the school grounds. Others may be obtained in the city.

WHAT TO BRING

Six towels, one pillow, two pairs pillow cases, two white spreads, one pair of blankets, two pairs of sheets, one spoon and one drinking glass.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES

Graduates of high schools who expect to teach will have a good opportunity here to get professional preparation. They can enter at set intervals and get in six terms of three months each.

If one attends thirty-six weeks he will receive a Normal Temporary certificate good for three years. (See Supt. Tidwell's announcement of changes in certification law elsewhere in this Bulletin.)

CLIMATE

The summers in Jacksonville are unusually mild and temperate, the nights always pleasant, the town being surrounded by mountains.

REDUCED RAILROAD RATES

Most of the railroads in this section of the state are granting round-trip rates. Apply to your agent when buying ticket to Jacksonville. You must write to us for an identification certificate.

VISIT OF OFFICIALS

Superintendent Tidwell and Secretary P. W. Hodges of the State Department are expected to visit the summer school at a time to be set later.

COACHING COURSE GIVEN

In addition to the regular courses offered, a coaching course in athletics will be given in the Physical Education Department. This is of special interest to principals and assistants who have some form of athletics started in their schools and who undertake to do this work.

DORMITORY FOR MEN

A modern, steam-heated, fire-proof dormitory for men is now completed and is available for occupancy during the summer school. Reservations should be made early.

CONFERENCE OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS AND SUPERVISORS

A conference of county superintendents and supervisors of this district will be held during the summer school. A representative of the State Department of Education at Montgomery will be present.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR PHYSICAL EXERCISES AND DEVELOPMENT

Physical instructors for men and women will be on hand during the summer school. Formal gymnastics will be given daily for men and women and regular periods will be set apart for the playing of games consisting of volley ball, baseball, indoor baseball for girls, and tennis. The gymnasium with competent instructors for both men and women will be open twice per week for each. Games which teachers may use in their schools will be played and taught. All students are taught to swim in the outdoor swimming pool connected with the gymnasium.

Announcements of State Department of Education For Summer Schools, 1929.

STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION ANNOUNCE- MENTS FOR SUMMER SCHOOLS, 1929

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

1. Requirements stated in this bulletin relate to certificates dated prior to July 1, 1928. The holder of a certificate of any grade or class bearing date of July 1, 1928, may apply credits earned this summer to the reinstatement of the certificate at the time of its expiration.

2. Any institution which for any reason may desire to modify the courses prescribed in this bulletin must submit in writing a statement of such modifications to the State Department of Education for approval prior to the publication of its summer school bulletin.

3. The registrar or other official of record of an institution shall enter a complete record of credits for every person entitled to issuance, renewal, or reinstatement of a certificate of any kind following the form prescribed on the blank furnished by the State Department of Education, Montgomery, Alabama.

4. Every person who is to receive a certificate of any kind bearing date of July 1, 1929, should, before leaving the summer school, arrange for the submission of an application directly from the institution attended to the State Department of Education. The handling of applications will be facilitated if the holder of a certificate to be renewed or reinstated will attach that certificate to the application or give proper description thereof as provided for on the application form.

REQUIREMENTS FOR RENEWAL AND REINSTATEMENT OF CERTIFICATES

I. Certificates issued on examination and by validation from other states.

1. The holder of a certificate issued on examination or by validation from another state is required to take for renewal or reinstatement of the certificate in a normal school the regular courses which are accepted for graduation and in a college either the courses offered for pre-normal certificates or other

courses for which credit is given toward graduation. Courses in physical and health education and public school music are required of every person who does not already have as much as three semester hours credit in each of these subjects. The holder of a special certificate in piano or public school music may renew or reinstate it only by completion of music courses extending over six or twelve weeks in an approved college or conservatory for which the equivalent of six or twelve semester hours of credit have been received.

Definitions:

a. The renewal of a certificate is its reissuance for one-half the period of its original life on six weeks of work in an approved institution with at least six semester hours of credit entered on the records.

b. The reinstatement of a certificate is its reissuance for the full period of its original validity on twelve weeks of work in an approved institution with twelve semester hours of credit entered on the records.

2. No credit will be allowed for renewal or reinstatement of any certificate on a course for a shorter period than six weeks in which the teacher earns at least six semester hours or nine quarter hours of credit. Reinstatement will be allowed on twelve weeks of work with twelve semester hours or eighteen quarter hours of credit.

3. An application for the renewal or the reinstatement of a certificate must receive credit for all courses prescribed or elected before the institution offering the courses may recommend to the State Department of Education the renewal or the reinstatement of the certificate desired.

II. Pre-Normal Certificates.

1. The holder of a second class pre-normal certificate may take the prescribed three-month courses offered in the normal schools and the colleges in the summer of 1929 to reinstate this certificate or to raise it to a first class pre-normal one. The holder of a first class pre-normal certificate issued prior to July 1, 1928, may reinstate this on the completion of three-month courses offered in the normal schools and the colleges or raise it to a normal temporary professional certificate by completing scholarship and residence requirements in a normal school.

2. Every holder of a pre-normal certificate of either class should if at all practicable take courses for its reinstatement in the same institution which made the original recommendation for its issuance. The transfer of credits from one institution to another is not advisable because of necessary deductions and inevitable loss of time.

3. An applicant for the issuance or the reinstatement of a pre-normal certificate must obtain credit for twelve semester hours or eighteen quarter hours before the institution offering the courses is authorized to recommend the issuance or the reinstatement of such certificate by the State Department of Education.

4. Every applicant for the issuance or the reinstatement of a pre-normal certificate of either class must present evidence of credit for at least three semester hours each in physical and health education and public school music.

5. The following courses have been prescribed for the is-

suance or the reinstatement of pre-normal certificates. In certain subjects the work should if practicable be differentiated for primary and intermediate teachers. The subjects in which this differentiation is required are indicated by an asterisk.

- a. Issuance of first class pre-normal certificates and reinstatement of second class pre-normal certificates:

Educational Psychology	4 hrs. per week
*Subject Matter and Methods in Language and Spelling	4 hrs. per week
Oral and Written Composition	4 hrs. per week
*Physical Education Activities	4 hrs. per week
*Public School Music Course II (2 hrs. credit)	4 hrs. per week

- b. Reinstatement of first class pre-normal certificates:

*Differentiated for primary and intermediate teachers.

6. A second grade certificate issued on examination or by validation from another state if held by a teacher of maturity and successful experience may be replaced by the issuance of a first class pre-normal certificate upon completion of prescribed courses on condition that at the end of the summer session the records of the institution making the recommendation shall show that the teacher has a minimum aggregate of twenty-four semester hours or thirty-six quarter hours of credit.

III. Class B Elementary Certificates.

1. The holder of a class B elementary professional certificate is required to take for its reinstatement only those courses which lead to the issuance of the certificate of next higher rank. These courses are offered only in the normal schools of Alabama. An applicant for the reinstatement of a class B elementary professional certificate must present an official statement showing three semester hours or four and one-half quarter hours of credit each in physical and health education and public school music. A class B elementary professional certificate that has not been previously extended on an additional quarter of work in a normal school may be reinstate only upon completion by its holder of an additional quarter of work with twelve semester hours or eighteen quarter hours of credit.

2. The holder of a class B elementary professional certificate who seeks its reinstatement should if at all practicable return for further study to the normal school which made the recommendation for the issuance of the original certificate. Loss of time and deduction of credit are almost inevitable to the person who changes from one institution to another before graduation.

IV. Class B Secondary Professional Certificates.

1. The holder of a class B secondary professional certificate is required to take for its reinstatement only those courses in colleges and universities which lead to the issuance of the certificate of next higher rank. Unless a class B secondary certificate has already been extended on an additional quarter of study in a college or a university, twelve weeks of study in residence with twelve semester hours or eighteen quarter hours of credit entered on the records will be required for its reinstatement. Applicant for the reinstatement of a class B secondary professional certificate should present credit for at least three semester hours in physical and health education.

2. The holder of a class B secondary professional certificate should if at all practicable take courses for its reinstatement in the same college or the university which recommended the issuance of the original certificate. There are inevitable losses of time and credit on the part of a person who changes from one institution to another before graduation.

V. Class A Elementary Professional, Class A Secondary Professional, and Special Subject Certificates.

The holder of a class A elementary professional certificate, a class A secondary professional certificate, or a special subject certificate is required to take for its reinstatement, those courses for which credit toward graduation is allowed by the institutions offering them. No credit may be allowed toward the reinstatement of such certificates for a course shorter than six weeks for which the student receives at least six semester hours or nine quarter hours of credit. Courses for the reinstatement of these certificates are given in colleges and universities only.

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

1. An applicant should bring and present to the classification committee any letters he may have received from the Normal School regarding credits. A certified copy of one's high school work should be sent to the Normal School by the principal on blank to be furnished by this school.

2. The equivalent of four years of high school work or fifteen units is required for entrance to Class A schools, said entrance requirements to be determined either by certificate or by examination as the president may elect. (For entrance to the pre-normal courses see note 6 below.)

3. Graduates from a four-year accredited high school are admitted to the junior year without examination.

4. Graduates of Class A colleges may enter senior year without examination and complete the professional course in one year or three terms.

5. Applicants for admission without certificates may enter any class by passing satisfactory examinations upon the work below the point of entrance.

6. Students of eighteen years of age who have eight units of high school work or hold a teachers' certificate may enter pre-normal at the discretion of the president.

7. Students from high schools not accredited will be classified as pre-normals or remain unclassified until they meet the entrance requirements.

8. Opportunity to take the entrance examinations will be given within the first three weeks of the quarter to those who have made sufficient previous preparation.

9. No student who enters over one week late will be permitted to undertake the full load of 18 hours of work.
