

RANDY BLADES (Producer -

Department Head and Professor of Costume Technology) has built costumes for theatres around the country including the Atlanta Opera, the Alliance Theatre, and the Utah Shakespeare Festival. His designs have appeared at Penn State, Auburn University-Montgomery, and the Maples Repertory Theatre. His recent costume design of The Normal Giant appeared at the St. Louis Fringe festival, The Fort Lauderdale Fringe Festival, and The Hollins Playwright's Lab. Costume Designs at JSU include *She Kills Monsters, Bloody Bloody Andrew Jackson, Into the Woods*, and *Antigone*. Randy has an MFA from Penn State in Costume Design, and a BA from Jacksonville State in Drama.



Susan Glaspell, the author of Alison's House, is one of the most important artists in American theater history. As a prominent playwright and one of the key founders of Provincetown Players, the first modern American repertory theater, Glaspell was integral to making the stage a venue not just for entertainment, but also a site where contemporary social issues could be addressed.

One of the most pressing issues during Glaspell's time was women's rights. Alison's House was written in 1930 and won the Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 1931, just barely a decade after women gained the right to vote in 1920. Her play, though, was less concerned with legal rights than women's abilities to control their own destinies. The conflict at the ostensible heart of Alison's House centers on the titular house, where a now-famous poet lived and died. The fictional poet Alison Stanhope is loosely based on the real life of Emily Dickinson, and Alison's family grapples not just with her property, but also with larger questions of artistic legacy.

More importantly, the play uses the theatrical trope of the fallen woman to explore changing sexual morals and differing family values. The fallen woman i.e. a woman who was perceived to engage in improper sexual behavior—was a common character in nineteenth and early-twentieth-century literature. Usually, the portrayals went one of two ways: either the fallen woman was a pathetic, wronged victim (examples include Fantine in Les Misérables and Little Emily in Charles Dickens' David Copperfield) or a fast-living, materialistic courtesan (examples include Violetta in the opera La Traviata and Becky Sharp in William Makepeace Thackeray's Vanity Fair). In Alison's House, the portrayal of the fallen woman moves beyond these characteristics to become an everywoman struggling to live a meaningful life in the best way she knows how.

Alison's House is a play without villains and heroes, a world where normal people struggle with doing the right thing. As New Year's Eve 1899 comes to a close, the question becomes whether the values of the old century will be carried into the new one.

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
