# A Higher Place in Heaven

May will find the Drama Department preparing for the 8th annual Southern Playwright's Competition winning production, A HIGHER PLACE IN HEAVEN. This play, written by Pamela Parker, was the winner of 1995's competition and will be produced by the Center for Southern Studies and the JSU Drama Department.

A HIGHER PLACE IN HEAVEN is a gentle, loving play that takes place on the front porch of an old mansion in South Georgia in 1925. The action of the play centers around two elderly women—one white, one black—and those around them as they deal with the changing times and learn that things don't always have to be the way that they seem—or "have always been."
