ABOUT THE PLAY . . .

Brighton Beach Memoirs is the first play in Neil Simon's trilogy dealing with the coming of age of Eugene Morris Jerome. When we meet him in 1937 at Brighton Beach, New York, Eugene is fifteen-years-old and a declared writer. The events of the play are narrated by Eugene as he speaks directly to the audience on subjects ranging from his dislike of the liver and cabbage his mother insists on making to the problems he experiences as a budding adolescent.

Surrounding Eugene are a father and mother struggling to make ends meet during the depression, a brother who is having trouble at work, and a widowed aunt who is living with her two daughters in the house along with Eugene's family. Problems arise, tempers flair, and angry words are exchanged. Through it all, however, is the sense that the Jerome family is just that—a family.

Brighton Beach Memoirs is both comedy and drama. In contrast to Eugene's humorous adolescence is a family struggling to remain intact at the end of the Great Depression and at the beginnings of the Nazi threat to world peace. Families are tested. Relationships change. Feelings are hurt. But in the final analysis, the play champions the ability of the human spirit to rebound from the trials it faces. The world of Brighton Beach is not perfect, but it is a world worth living in.

ABOUT NEIL SIMON . . .

Neil Simon is one of America's most prolific playwrights. Born in the area he writes of in his Jerome trilogy, Simon worked in the ''golden days'' of television and was to hit Broadway with Come Blow Your Horn (1961) and Barefoot in the Park (1964). He is also the author of two fine comedy/dramas, The Odd Couple (1965) and The Sunshine Boys (1972).

Simon has been accused of being a "popular" playwright, one who writes "theatre" rather than drama. The librettos for the musicals Little Me (1962), Sweet Charity (1966), Promises, Promises (1968), and They're Playing Our Song (1988). But his autobiographical trilogy — Brighton Beach Memoirs (1972), Biloxi Blues (1984), and Broadway Bound (1986) — proves otherwise. In these plays, Neil Simon explores family life, values, and the need for human contact with a poignancy that can be traced directly back to his successful early career as represented by Barefoot in the Park.

ABOUT THE DIRECTOR . . .

Tonight's show is being directed by Kathleen Welker who holds a Master of Arts Degree from Jacksonville State University. Kathleen a veteran of the JSU stage, has acted in such plays as California Suite, Silent Night, Lonely Night, The Man Who Came to Dinner, and The Price. Kathleen manages to fit acting and directing into an already crowded schedule which includes being a wife, a mother of three, and holding a full-time job at Fort McClellan. She wishes to pursue directing in the Army Morale Support Activity.
