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### THE SPRING QUARTER

The Spring Quarter begins March 11, and one can make the full quarter's work by entering not over one week after class work begins which is March 19. If one is teaching or for any other reason cannot enter for the full Spring Quarter, he can enter for the latter half of the Spring Quarter, April 22, and make a full quarter of work by the middle of the Summer Quarter or  $4\frac{1}{2}$  months by the end of the Summer Quarter. New classes will be started for those who enter on any entering date provided there are a sufficient number to form a section.

### SUMMER SCHOOL

Registration for Summer School begins Monday, May 27. The second term of the Summer School begins July 8.

### COURSES OFFERED IN SUMMER QUARTER

1. The regular four-year course.
2. Courses for extension and renewal of certificates.
3. Courses for removal of conditions and for making additional credits.

### EXPENSES

Fees—the fees are \$1.50 per quarter hour, plus a registration fee of \$5.25 per quarter, payable in advance upon entrance by every student.

Board at Daugette Hall Dormitory for the entire quarter is \$55.00, payable in advance. For the first term it is \$30.00 and for the second term \$25.00.

Board with the student's co-operative boarding club is \$15.00 per month.

Apartments for light housekeeping may be had in the new apartment dormitory and in the town.

### FACULTY

The faculty for the Summer School is the regular faculty of the college, no one of whom holds less than two degrees, while many of them hold three, and all have years of professional experience.

With the permission of the classification committee a student may elect Mathematics in the straight four-year curriculum in lieu of this year of World History.

### **DORMITORIES**

The reservation fee for a room in the dormitories for men or women is \$1.00.

There are two for women and one for men, also one apartment dormitory for young women and married couples. These accommodations are limited and the fee should be sent promptly as soon as decision to attend has been reached. The overflow students are accommodated in the homes of the town.

### **WHAT TO BRING**

Cover, room linen, pillow, drinking glass and teaspoon.

### **REDUCED RAILROAD RATES**

Most of the railroads are giving reduced rates for round trips. Apply to your agent when buying tickets to Jacksonville.

### **CERTIFICATES**

All certificates may be renewed or extended by an attendance in the Spring or Summer. Salaries in public schools depend largely on grades of certificates and experience.

The certification laws of the State have been changed so that a high school graduate must enter by the beginning of the Spring Quarter—March 11, or March 19 by paying a late fee of \$2.00—in order to be eligible for a certificate at the end of two years. If one delays entrance for a longer period it will be necessary that he attend three years before securing a certificate as the two-year certificate will be discontinued. By entering at the beginning of the Spring Quarter one can become eligible by coming continuously winter and summer.

### **CONFERENCE OF SUPERINTENDENTS AND SUPERVISORS**

A conference of superintendents and supervisors of this teachers college district will be held during the Summer, the date to be announced later. A representative of the State Department of Education will take part in it.

### **COURSES OF STUDY**

The same general courses are offered for the Summer School as for the regular session. All courses lead to the Bachelor of Science Degree.

### **CONDITIONS FOR STUDY**

One of the most important conditions for study in the hot months of the summer is climate. Jacksonville is located in the mountains of Northeast Alabama. The days are usually pleasant and most of the nights are cool enough to require cover.

### **ATHLETICS AND RECREATION**

Students have the opportunity of playing tennis, volleyball, baseball, and other games during the Spring and Summer. The swimming pool will be opened as soon as weather conditions permit. Picnics and outings by clubs and special groups under proper supervision are a feature of the recreation of the Summer School students.
